Sara Meyer: So, we'll be here all day because there's some incredible nonprofits. The SECO Energy Foundation has awarded over one million dollars; over 80 nonprofits have been supported through this mission. And so many of them are fantastic. One of them, I just think is so near and dear to my heart, is called LovExtension.

And they provide services for low-income seniors and families. Mainly one of the reasons we really just genuinely, fell in love with this nonprofit was because they care so deeply and they're so unique in how they do things, such as they'll sit down in a companionship conversation and ask, what are your dietary restrictions? So, there's a lot of dignity and value in that. And people are actually given food they can actually eat. That's rare, you know, in the environment that we're in. And so, that really stood out to us at the foundation, and we were very happy to award them some funding and see their growth.

And there's really the simplicity of it. You're not even thinking about it. It's just being rounded up on your bill to the next dollar.
